There is a car park with accessible parking at the front of the museum. I can book tickets online before I visit or buy them at the ticket desk.

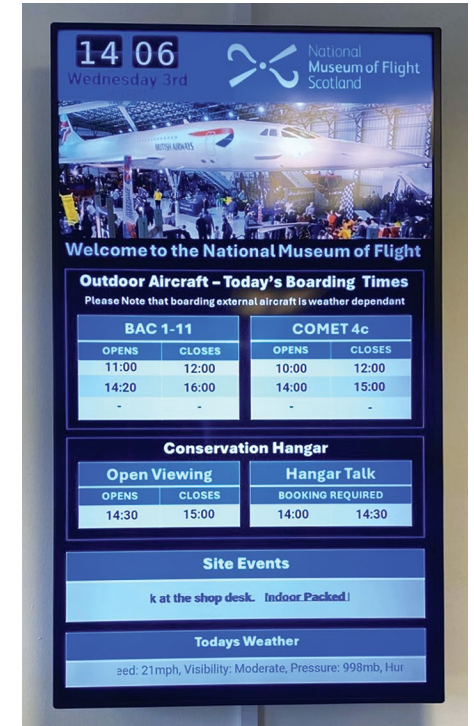
I go into the museum through this entrance.

In this gallery I can go inside Concorde if I want to.

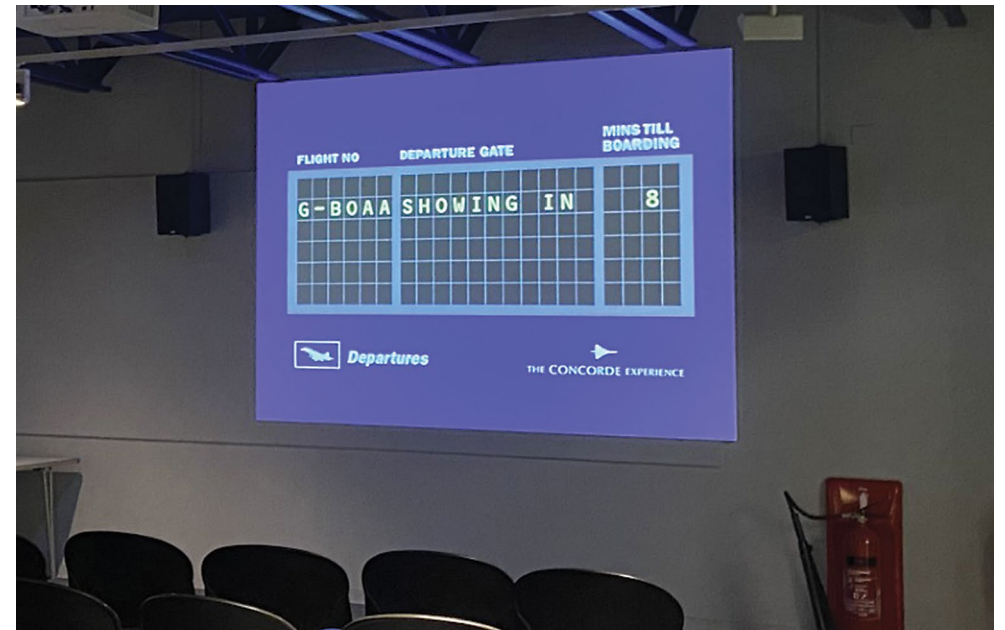


There is an information desk.

Parachute Store



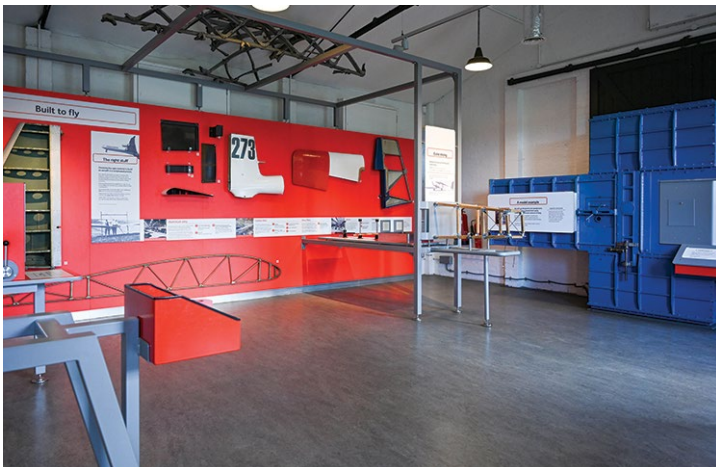
The Parachute Store has an audio narrative so I will hear talking.

At certain times it is possible to look inside two aircraft: The Comet and the BAC 1-11.

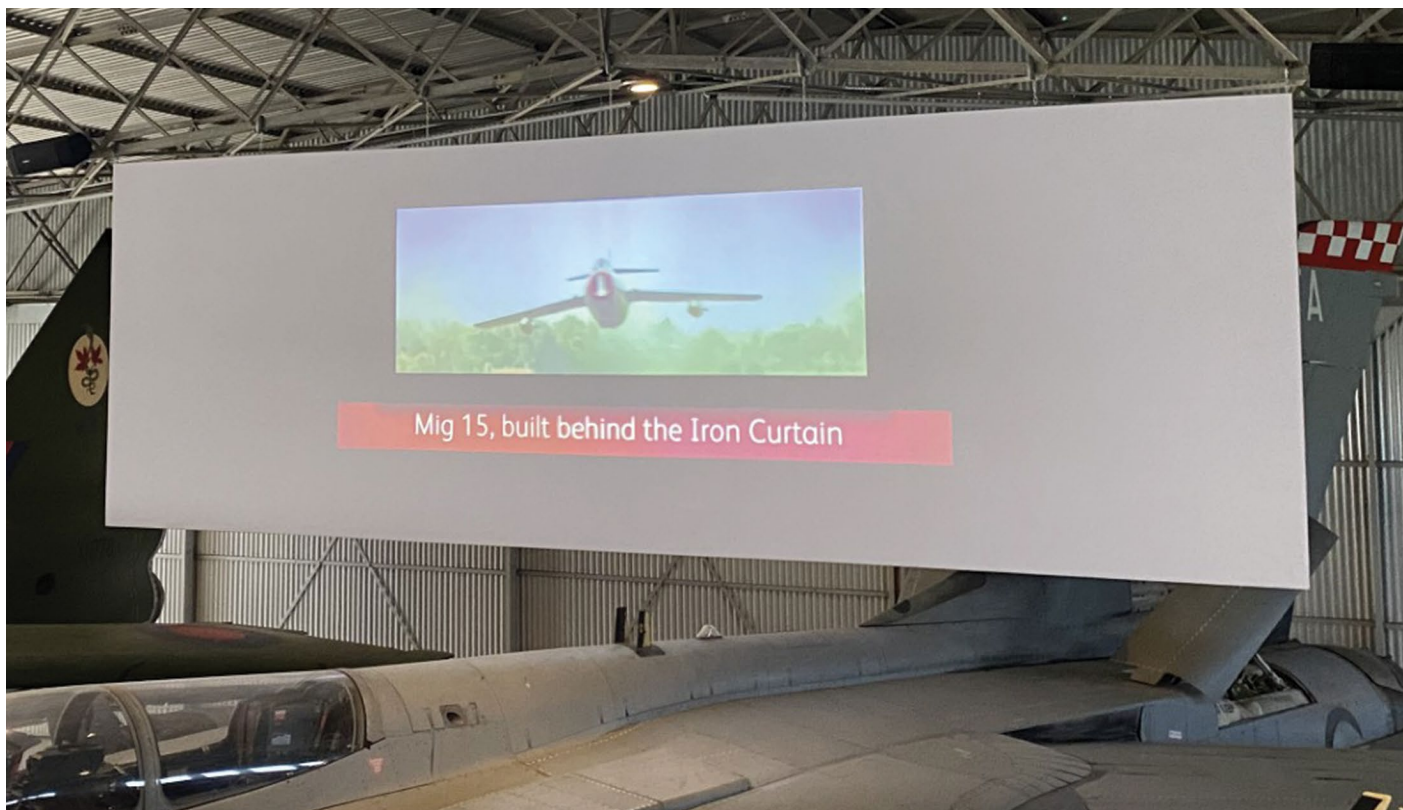


Outside space.
