Description

Knife and sheath. The knife has a Sheffield steel[?] blade with makers mark on one side, and a wooden handle wrapped in dyed porcupine quills, the majority of which is red/orange in colour with strips of black and white around the centre. Attached to the end of the handle are two strips with a metal cone filled with dyed red moose hair [?] attached to the end of both. The knife fits inside a sheath made from animal hide/leather which is also decorated with dyed porcupine quills on the front side, with white glass[?] beads attached to the outer edge of the sheath. There are also eight metal cones (four down either edge and two at the bottom) filled with dyed red hair attached to the outer edge of the sheath. There is a strap for suspension around the neck attached to the top of the sheath, which is comprised of strands of vegetable fibre[?] wrapped in porcupine quills dyed red, black and yellow/white.

Description

Powder horn and quillwork strap. The powder horn is a tear-drop or pear-shaped flask made from horn, green and white in colour with a brass metal tip/spout and strip around the edge. The flask is flat on the back side and convex on the front. There are two suspension loops on the metal edging on both sides of the flask, which the strap is attached to with an animal hide cord threaded through both loops and tied off at the bottom. The strap itself is comprised of seven individual strands of vegetable fibre[?] wrapped in porcupine quills dyed orange, black and white/yellow. This forms a pattern comprised of a zigzag line or thunderbolt-shape of blue colour outlined in white against an orange background. These strands are secured together at regular intervals to prevent them from spreading out. At each end of the strap the strands are tied with animal hide and the middle strand turns into a leather cord which attaches to the horn flask as above. The other six become tassels also of porcupine quill and each has a metal cone suspended from the end of it.
